





A simple and effective device for the naterial necessary for constructing this machine can be obtained by to-bacco growers from almost any chemcal supply house. The foot bellows tube (B) to the valve tube (C). The glass tube (D) is fitted with a rubber cork (E), in which the valve tube is inserted. The top of the cork is covered with a piece of finely woven gauze in order to prevent the seeds from entering the valve tube. About an ounce of seed for separation is plac-ed in the glass tube, and a current of air is injected by means of the foot bellows. The strength of this current nust be regulated by the valve (C) so at only the dirt, chaff and light seed will be blown out of the top of the tube. It is advisable to screen out all of the large particles of hulls and trash before putting the seed in the tube.

It is claimed to be easily within the reach of every tobacco grower to select his seed plants in the manner outlined and to thereby improve his crop without any extra expense and very little
