



A movable roof for a haystack, one

The diagram herewith shows the true way to frame around the corner post and the manner of arranging the sweep for raising and lowering. Four straight chestnut poles twenty-two feet long are selected from the woods and ceive the holts which support the roof. They are set four feet in the ground and eighteen feet apart, as that is a
