PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, in and by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "an act regulating the general elections within this Commonwealth," passed the 15th day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, it is enjoined on the Sheriff of each county within this Commonwealth, to give public notice of such elections to be held, and to enumerate in such notice what officers are to be elected: I, MICHAEL HOLCOMB, High Sheriff of the county of Cumberland, do therefore hereby make known and give this

PUBLIC NOTICE.

To the electors of the County of Cumberland, that on the
Second Tuesday in October next, (being the 10th day of the month,) a General Election will be held at the several election districts established by law in said county, at which time, and for the several officers hereinafter named, they will vote by ballot viz.:

TWO PERSONS

to represent the district composing the counties of Cumberland, Adams, and Franklin, in the Senate of Pennsylvania.

TWO PERSONS

to represent the county of Cumberland in the House of Representatives of Pennsylvania.

ONE COMMISSIONER

for the county of Cumberland, to serve for the term of one year.

TWO SHERIFFS

ONE DIRECTOR OF THE POOR and of the House of Employment; and ONE AUDITOR to settle the public accounts of the county Commissioners, &c.

And in and by an act of the General Assembly of this Commonwealth, passed the 17th day of March, 1805, it is directed that the Inspectors of said general election shall be chosen by ballot on the Friday next preceding the first Tuesday in October (being the 29th day of September next,) at the usual place of holding township elections to be held by the respective constables, who are required to give at least one week's public notice of such election, and the said constable in each township shall be assisted by two qualified electors who are required to be sworn to by the said constable, and to be present at the election, and to perform the duties enjoined on them by law.

And the Return Judges of the respective districts are hereby required to meet at the Court House in Carlisle, on the Friday next after the 2d Tuesday in October next, and there to perform those things required of them by the aforesaid act.

And in and by an act of the general assembly, passed 2d of April, 1821—
Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, that it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the several qualified electors who shall vote at any general or special election within this Commonwealth, shall give into the inspector of such election separate tickets for each station or office voted for, which ticket shall contain no more than the proper number of names, but no ticket shall be rejected by the judges of the election in counting of the votes should the same contain fewer names than the proper number—those for Sheriff and coroners excepted.

Section 4. And be it enacted by the authority of the aforesaid, That it shall be the duty of the Sheriff or Coroner, as the case may be, of such, and every county within this Commonwealth to give public notice at the same time and place, and in the same manner, and under the same penalty, that he is now required to give notice of a general or special election, that every elector shall hold any office or appointment, or trust under the government of the United States, whether a commissioned officer otherwise a subordinate officer, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, Executive or Judiciary Departments of the United States, and also that every member of Congress is by the same incapable of holding or exercising any such office or appointment, or of being a Justice of the Peace, or Clerk of any election in this State.
