The Secretary estimates the receipts into the Treasury for the current year, in round numbers. at about twenty millions of dollars, and the expenditures at about thirty-three millions, showing an excess of expenses of nearly THIRTEEN MIL LIONS. At the beginning of the fiscal year there was a balance in the treasury of nearly SEVEN prictions, which will not only be used up, but the country will have a debt of about SIX MIL-LIONS.
