Correspondence of the Herald & Expositor. HARRISBURG, Dec. 9, 1837.

The General Assembly of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the Constitutional requirement, met on Tuesday last, the 5th instant. The House at 12 o'clock, M.

The Senate at 3 o'clock, P. M. In the former ninety seven members answered to their names, the three absentees were Messrs. Hershe, McClelland and Yearick. Mr. Yearick is still absent.

On Wednesday there was not much done beyond the presentation of petitions, all of which were upon local questions, which would not be deemed interesting to your readers.

Mr. Hirst of Northampton, took the "assembled wisdom" to account with unglazed hands—he submitted the following: Whereas, the convention elected to propose amendments to the Constitution, has now been about four months in session, at a great expense to the Commonwealth, and from present appearances may continue its session to an indefinite period, without any prospect of ultimate good—therefore,

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to inquire into and report upon the expediency of repealing, from and after the first day of January next, (unless an earlier adjournment takes place,) so much of the act of the 28th March, 1836, providing for the call of a Convention to propose amendments to the Constitution, as makes provision for the daily pay of the members, and the contingent expenses of the said Convention—which was laid on the table.
