Correspondence of the Herald & Expositor, HARRISBURG, April 9, 1859.

Monday 2.—Among the petitions presented to the House this morning, were several for a contiguous rail road from Chambersburg by the way of Laughlinstown to Pittsburgh.

Mr. Copley, from the committee appointed to enquire into the truth or falsity of the allegations charging Mr. Reynolds, of Westmoreland, with an attempt to bribe Mr. Thompson, made report.

Mr. Reynolds, Mr. Thompson, of York Bank, or any persons connected therewith. They state in justice to that institution that nothing has occurred to implicate it in an attempt to influence the vote of Mr. Thompson on the sub-treasury resolutions.

Mr. Ford, from the minority of the committee, also made report. The minority do not hold Mr. Reynolds so entirely guiltless of the grave and weighty charges preferred against him, and which were sustained by conclusive evidence.

Mr. Spackman presented the memorial of the Philadelphia and Reading rail road company, praying for authority to extend their road to Harrisburg.

A bill was passed on first reading, and sent to the Senate, appropriating fifteen thousand dollars for rebuilding the rail road bridge lately consumed by fire.

Among the petitions presented in the Senate, this morning, were several praying that the Philadelphia and Reading rail road company might be permitted to extend their road to Harrisburg.

The bill to repeal the law licensing hawkers and peddlers, being again up in committee of the whole, was opposed by Mr. Stevens, who said that this bill was designed to disfranchise certain citizens, and intended to give preemption rights to others.

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After the amendment was carried, the Yeas and Nays were called on the section as amended, the vote being taken the section was lost, by a vote of 44 to 40.
