

Any other construction would attribute to the Legislature the design to make a contract which possibly might be violated.

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The bill to incorporate a coal company in Tioga county, passed third reading—years 40, says 27.

A bill to provide for the introduction of water into the borough of West Chester, was under consideration most of the session.

Mr. Dillingham eloquently supported the bill, and it finally passed.

In the Senate, Mr. Myers offered a resolution making an appropriation, and appointing a committee to superintend certain operations to embellish the public grounds around the capitol.

The vote on the passage of the Offerman coal company—years 30, says 6.

The education bill passed final reading. The committee of conference on the improvement bill, have not yet reported, and they cannot agree.

Wednesday 11.—Mr. Stevens presented a memorial from Mr. John Agg, relative to his expenses as stenographer to the late convention.

The amendments of the Senate to the Education bill were concurred in. A bill supplementary to the act to incorporate the Susquehanna canal company was considered and passed.

On motion, the House then reconsidered the vote of yesterday, on the bill to incorporate the Offerman coal company, which had been vetoed by the Governor.

Mr. Hopkins inquired of the Speaker, whether a committee of conference had power to strike out entire sections after they have been agreed upon.

The report of the committee was before the house, for acceptance or rejection. Mr. Stevens cited several instances where the power had been exercised, in Congress as well as in the Legislature.

A motion was then made by Mr. McElwee to postpone the bill and have it printed, which was negatived, 56 to 33.

Mr. McElwee offered one, to grant ten thousand dollars for the purpose of erecting Public Baths in the borough of Harrisburg.

Mr. Hopkins offered a resolution for the appointment of a committee to inquire into the cause of the delay in the printing of the report of the Superintendent of Common Schools.

The bill to aid the Delaware County Institute, and the Pittsburgh and Pottsville Institutes, came up, and after a very warm debate upon amendments proposed, it was postponed for the present.

Mr. Ford offered a joint resolution appropriating thirteen thousand dollars for a removal of the buildings at the head of the inclined plane at Columbia.
