THE FIRST ANNUAL REPORT. Of the Managers of the Cumberland County Colonization Society. The duties of an auxiliary Colonization Society, though highly important, are limited in their extent: to inform and animate the public mind on the subject, and collect the contributions of its members and friends, constitute its annual routine. Referring, therefore, to other sources for intelligence respecting the more grand and interesting operations of the parent society, we confine our report to these two points.
