FACTS FOR THE PEOPLE.

STATE DEBT.—When Gov. Wolf was elected Governor in 1829 the Commonwealth owed for money borrowed, \$8,140,000 00.

When he went out of office in 1835, the amount borrowed was 24,054,443 32.

Borrowed by Geo. Wolf in six years, and debt increased 16,914,443 32.

When Joseph Ritner was elected Governor in 1835, he found the debt as Geo. Wolf had left it 24,054,443 32.

On the 1st day of June, 1838, it amounted to 24,430,003 32.

Paid off by Gov. Ritner, in two years and six months, 224,440 00.

PUBLIC WORKS.—Amount received for Canal and Rail-road tolls, during the six years of Wolf's administration, 1,200,468 00.

Amount received for tolls during two years and six months of Ritner's administration, 2,425,174 30.

Difference in favor of Ritner's administration, 1,164,698 33.

COMMON SCHOOLS.—Amount paid by the Commonwealth to the Common Schools during the six years of Wolf's administration, 75,000 00.

Amount paid in two years and six months of Ritner's administration, 983,910 00.

STATE TAXES.—Amount paid in taxes by the people to support Wolf's administration, 777,175 50.

Amount repaid by Gov. Ritner, and saved to the people in one year, 204,509 17.

PREMIUM ON LOANS.—Governor Wolf received during his administration, for and on account of the money he borrowed, in the shape of premiums, 1,208,278 30.

Governor Ritner has refused to increase the State debt by negotiating any permanent loans, and has therefore had to get along without premiums.
