CONSTITUTION

COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA. WHEREAS the Convention of one thousand one hundred and thirty-seven delegates, convened at Harrisburg on the 1st day of September, 1837, has agreed upon the following Constitution for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania:

ARTICLE I. Section 1. The legislative power of this Commonwealth shall be vested in a General Assembly, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

ARTICLE II. Section 1. The Executive power of this Commonwealth shall be vested in a Governor, who shall hold office for a term of four years, and shall be eligible for a second term.

ARTICLE III. Section 1. The Judicial power of this Commonwealth shall be vested in a Supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as may be established by law.

ARTICLE IV. Section 1. All Courts of Law shall be held in open Court, and the records of all such Courts shall be open to the inspection of all persons.

ARTICLE V. Section 1. No person shall be deprived of his property without just compensation therefor.

ARTICLE VI. Section 1. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated.

ARTICLE VII. Section 1. No person shall be held to answer for a criminal offense until after he has been indicted by a grand jury.

ARTICLE VIII. Section 1. No person shall be deprived of his liberty without due process of law.

ARTICLE IX. Section 1. No person shall be deprived of his property without just compensation therefor.
