

FROM HARRISBURG.

We give below full reports of all that has taken place in Harrisburg since our last...

Harrisburg, Dec. 8, 1838.

The town is in a great measure restored to quiet, although the bullies and rowdies that composed the mob have not by any means entirely disappeared.

The Senate was unable to form a quorum yesterday, and the Van Buren portion of the House only met to adjourn, not pretending to do any business.

Petitions were presented and received containing the election of Messrs. Hanna and Wagner of the county, and Mr. Bell of Chester, and Monday next fixed upon for the appointment of the committees.

The gentlemen present who are contesting the seats of others, were admitted to seats within the bar of the chamber until their cases should be decided upon.

There have been several attempts made to effect a compromise; but as yet all have failed, and I see no more prospect now of coming to an amicable understanding than there was at first.

There was a quorum of members of the Senate in attendance to-day. Perhaps all the members were there, with the exception of Mr. Penrose, the speaker.

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It was a business day in the Senate. Mr. Fraley (city) offered a resolution that the committee under the law relative to contested elections be named on Monday in the case of the third district.

Mr. Rogers offered one of the same tenor, relative to the second district, composed of Philadelphia county, which was also agreed to.

Mr. Pearson offered one to refer the returns from the eighth district to a committee of five, which was laid on the table.

Mr. Fraley (city) also offered one to allow those gentlemen contesting seats, to be and appear within the bar of the Senate, which was agreed to.

A resolution was passed nem con. calling upon the Secretary for all the papers in his possession relative to the election of Senators the present year.

The annual report of the State Treasurer was received. Mr. Shunk was announced as the Clerk of the H. of R. and he laid on the clerk's table a paper, which was received and announced to the Senate by Mr. Strohm, as a paper purporting to be from the house of representatives.

It is understood that warrants have been issued against several of the mobites, and that they are now among the missing. But a large majority of the picked bullies from the county, are still here prowling about.

The excitement in this place is not so great at present as it has been during the past weeks.—This is owing to the fact, that a large military force from Philadelphia, under the command of Major General Paterson, is now here, being determined to suppress all riotous proceedings, and uphold the supremacy of the laws.

The appearance of this volunteer force, who turned out in obedience to the governor's proclamation, has somewhat abated the ardor of the mobocracy, and caused them to be less bold and insolent than they have been.

The judge deserves the thanks of every lover of good order for the decided stand he has taken in defence of the supremacy of the laws and the constitution.

The Senate met this morning and transacted some business; but nothing of any great importance to our readers was acted on, with the exception of the fact, that the Speaker gave notice that, on to-morrow, he will open and count, in presence of the members of both houses, the votes on the subject of the amendments to the constitution.

After the journal was read, Messrs. Rogers and Barclay were appointed tellers for the election of a clerk, who reported that George W. Hamersley had 17 votes, and Edwin N. Huettner had 10 votes.

Mr. Hamersley was therefore declared duly elected, who nominated David Middlecoff as his assistant clerk, which nomination was unanimously agreed to.

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Mr. Fraley (city) asked leave to read a bill in his place, which was granted.
