They are both works which, if they were yet to be commenced, should neither be undertaken in the present condition of the Treasury nor in view of the stronger claims of other works long since begun, but yet unfinished. But they are now, by the delibcrate voice of your predecessors, incorporated as a part of the system and should be carried on as rapidly as the resources of the State, and prior claims will justify.
