The Executive Committee of the Cumberland County Temperance Society greet the association, in the return of another anniversary, with mingled feelings of regret, on account of the feebleness of their own operations, and of confidence in the increasing strength and brightening prospects of the cause in which they are engaged.

The Society in Newville is one of the oldest in the county, having been formed in 1829. It was visited by one of your committees in February last, when much interest was manifested in behalf of the cause, as also at another meeting held by the Society in August last.

It is to this object that your committee have mainly directed their efforts. Believing that the making and selling of intoxicating liquors, as a beverage, is a national evil, subversive of the pecuniary, the physical, the intellectual, and the moral interests of society, increasing to an enormous extent the amount of our taxes, while it diminishes the ability to pay them.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY LYCEUM.

Constitution of the Cumberland County Lyceum, as revised, Dec. 29, 1888.

Art. 1. This association shall be called the Cumberland County Lyceum, auxiliary to the Pennsylvania Lyceum.

Art. 2. The objects of the Lyceum shall be the mutual improvement of its members, and the general diffusion of knowledge throughout the county, and other parts of the state and country.

Art. 3. Any person may be a member of the Lyceum, by giving his or her name as such, and paying twenty-five cents annually; but shall forfeit his membership by neglecting to pay three successive semi-annual payments.

Art. 4. The officers of the society shall be a President, four Vice Presidents, a Recording Secretary who shall act as Treasurer, a corresponding Secretary, and an Executive Committee of three, to be elected annually.

Art. 5. The Executive Committee and the Secretaries shall be elected from the citizens of Carlisle, and shall constitute the Executive Board of the Lyceum, who shall have charge of the Cabinet and other property of the Lyceum, make all necessary provision for its meetings, and control the disposition of its funds, subject to the by-laws and instructions of the society.

Art. 6. The Lyceum shall hold quarterly meetings in different parts of the county, under the direction of the Executive Board, on the last Saturday of December, and as nearly as may be at equal intervals through the year.

Art. 7. This constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any regular meeting of the Lyceum.

MARKETS.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 19, 1890.

WHEAT.—A parcel of 800 bushels prime Md. red was sold in the week at \$1.80. A parcel of 300 to 400 bushels Md. red, afloat to-day, is held at \$1.80.

COGNAC.—On Monday a sale of old from store was made at 95 cents. Since yesterday there have been several parcels of New Corn afloat in market, sales of which were made at first at 90 cents, and afterwards at 88c.

FLAXSEED.—Continues to arrive in small quantities, and is taken from wagons at \$1.56 to \$1.62, and held from stores at \$1.69 to \$1.75, per bushel.

WHEAT.—A sale of a lot of prime Virginia Seed was made early in the week at \$14 per bushel, since which we hear of no transactions.

WISKEY.—Sales of hhds. at 41 cents—now at the close of the week, they are quite dull. Sales of bbls. at 44 a 45 cents, from stores. The wagon price of bbls, continues at 40 cents, exclusive of the barrel.

FLUR & MEAL.—The demand for Flour has been less active for foreign shipment, partly owing to the high rates of freight to England, and prices have slightly receded.

GRAIN.—Wheat is in better request; sales of fair Pennsylvania at \$1.77 and good at \$1.80 per bushel—stock small.

SEEDS.—Prices are unchanged, with limited receipts of Flaxseed. In Cloverseed we are still without sales to report.

WHISKEY.—Sales advanced two cents in hhds; small sales at 38 a 30 cents; Bbls. are very scarce, and command over 40 cts.
