SENATOR FROM NEW YORK.

The Senate of New York has been guilty of a deed of the most high handed and infamous usurpation. It is known to our readers that there is in that body a small Locco Foco majority, the vote, upon party questions, standing 14 Whigs to 18 Locco Focos. The law of the State regulating the election of United States Senator, provides that each house shall make a nomination in separate meeting, and that they shall then assemble in joint meeting and, upon comparing the nominations, it appears that both houses have nominated the same person, he is declared duly elected.

WILLIAM BERUM, Lt. Com'dr. United S. Schooner, Shark, &c. Libson, Feb. 20, 1839.

The following is the finding and sentence of the Court. The whole evidence in the case was read and matter being considered, and the Court of opinion that the first specification of the charge is proved in part, to wit as much as said specification as relates to Passed Midshipman, Wood, running in debt to Paul Bonifacio, without means known to the Court of cancelling this same; also as much as said specification as relates to pulling funds having been used on the occasion specified to pay the said Passed Midshipman Wood's debt. It is not in the opinion of the Court clearly proved that Passed Midshipman Wood ran in debt to others, nor it is proved that the Com'dr was exclusively aroused or the public funds, exclusively appropriated to pay Passed Midshipman Wood's debt. Nor is it proved that the Com'dr was aroused from his bed as stated in the specification.

The Court find Passed Midshipman Harry P. T. Wood not guilty in the first charge, in its full extent; but guilty of great indiscretion and imprudence in risking the character of the service by contracting a debt without view of means of paying it.

That the specification of the 2d charge being read the Court are of opinion that the said specification is proved in part, to wit as much as said specification as relates to the Court find and adjudge the said Passed Midshipman Wood guilty of said 2d charge. The Court are without mature deliberation, do sentence that the said Harry P. T. Wood, Passed Midshipman in the United States Navy, is suspended from duty for six months, and further that he be dismissed from the Mediterranean.

The Court also recommend that the finding, together with the sentence of the court be publicly read on board the vessels of the Navy, and that the Com'dr be confined in the stocks for one month, for the confinement of Passed Midshipman Wood on board a small vessel.

MARKETS.

Baltimore, February 18. FLOUR.—The market has evinced an unsettled and feverish character throughout the week. On Monday, a parcel of 1000 bbls, was sold at \$8.50, less 20 days interest. On Tuesday, holders were offering to sell at \$8.37; and on that day and Wednesday, sales were made at that price. The English advices by the Cambridge were generally published on Thursday morning, and on the same morning sales of several parcels were made at \$8.37. On the same day, however, a sale of 200 bbls, was made at \$8.25, and we believe that one or two other parcels were sold at that price. Today holders very generally ask \$8.37; there is one, however, who is willing to sell at \$8.25.

GRAIN.—Wheat—On Tuesday a crop of prime Md. red was sold at \$1.85 per bushel. Since then, sales of good to prime reds have been making in small lots at \$1.80 to \$1.85. Receipts trifling.

CORN.—Sales of Virginia, straw coloured, on Tuesday, at 85 cents. Sales of Md. white at 85 cents, and of Maryland yellow at 88 cents.

RYE.—A parcel of Md. has been sold at \$1.05.—None now in market and much wanted.

OPS.—We quote at 48 a 50 cents.

FLAX SEED.—Owing to the advanced stage of the season this article has almost ceased to arrive in market. The small lots that come in are taken from wagons at \$1.56 to \$1.62, and the store prices continue at \$1.69 to \$1.75 per bushel.

CLOVER SEED.—There is a good supply of clover seed in market, and sales have been made from stores at \$13 to \$15.75 per bushel, the latter price for prime Western seed. We quote the store price at \$13 to \$15 as in quality.

WHISKEY.—The market remains quiet, without any alteration in prices. We quote hhd's at 41 cents, and bbls. from stores at 44 a 45 cents. The wagon price of bbls. is 40 cents, exclusive of the barrels.

The feet surgeon, (Dr. Boyl), and others were tested by you to grant me all the liberties and facilities necessary to a strict attention to him on shore. That I fully performed my duty, I have to refer to the fact signed by Mr. Barton, himself, and Dr. Boyl's attention to the sick at all times, needs no comment. My opinion is that it would have been more judicious to have removed Mr. Barton from the deck of the Constitution before the full extent of the wound was known, it might then have been expedient to have removed him on shore, before inflammation and the accompanying fever generally consequent to severe wounds should have succeeded. I think likewise it would have been improper for Mr. Barton to have remained on board the Constitution under the existing circumstances, as he had the wound of the Mediterranean to run down in the hazy winter months, and when the steadiest ship would have been but ill suited to the treatment necessary in his case. All the comforts and necessities his case demanded, were furnished by your orders after he came under my care. A servant of mine was sent from the Shark while we were in port, and the articles necessary which belonged to the hospital department of the Shark, were left with him by your orders. The best surgeon in my power was procured for Mr. Barton, and he was left to the care of our worthy Com'dr. Mr. O'Fly.

G. U. S. SHIP CONSTITUTION, Libson, February 27, 1837.

Sir—Agreeably to your request, I have the honor to state, that I have always understood from Mr. Wood that his quarrel with Mr. Barton, originated prior to the time of his being appointed to the Constitution; while on board that ship they were not on speaking terms. After Mr. Barton was ordered to the Shark in Smyrna, he was called to the deck of the boat and which Mr. Robinson reported to Mr. Wood on his return to the vessel.—Mr. Wood expressed the cause of Mr. Robinson's being sent to the Shark, and Mr. Wood and Mr. Barton, respecting the same, and a challenge from Mr. Barton to Mr. Wood was the consequence.

Deposition of George Dinnett, seaman, At Sea.

That some time between the 1st and the 8th day of November, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, I was present on board the United States Schooner, Shark, in the gun-deck, and ordered all the watch on deck, sweepers including that in accordance thereto I went on deck with my broom in my hand, and I proceeded to the fore-board fore-lift jigger, that while there Passed Midshipman Barton, master mate of the said deck, came up the starboard fore ladder, and called to me, and I immediately answered him. He then asked me what I was doing on deck. I told him I was sweeping by the boardway to make sail, he said damn your eyes, get down below, and I proceeded to the deck, and without an order from me. Upon which I turned to go down below, when he took the broom out of my hand, and commenced pushing me in the face, and I turned round and told him that I had done wrong to take me to the officer of the deck and let him punish me, or something to that purpose, that he then raised the broom to strike me, when I seized it and took it from him and threw it on the deck and turned to go around the foremast to go down into the fore-board fore ladder, when I immediately took a sharp instrument called a dirk, and went to strike a dirk thrust by the said Passed Midshipman Barton.
