AWFUL MISTAKES.

The Volunteer Extra, issued on Tuesday, claims a Van Buren majority in Berks county of 6,750. Now by the Official Returns, we find that there were but 4,033 votes, IN ALL, polled for Con-

gress—and an average vote of a fraction over 4100. This is a sad mistake in favor of Van Buren of 2717. In Columbia county, where the Whigs nominated no candidates for Assembly, the Volunteer Extra takes the Assembly Ticket as a test, and claims 18-0 majority. The official returns show that their real majority is only 1113—another mistake of 767 in favor of Van Buren. In York, the Volunteer Extra claims 850; the official returns shows the true majority to be 463—another error in favor of Van Buren of 400. Our readers and the public may take these as fair samples, and judge the whole Extra by them. It is made up, from head to tail, of positive falsehoods, deliberately uttered, for the purpose of deception. The popular vote of Pennsylvania is close—but a true test will show it to be in favor of the Harrison party. We have been victorious beyond our expectations. We have carried everything where every thing was doubtful; and we shall go into the Presidential election on the 30th, with the utmost confidence of giving the Electoral vote of Pennsylvania to Harrison & Tyler by a majority of

Buckle on your armor, friends of Reform; go to the polls every man that prizes the welfare of his country; and rely upon it the victory will be ours, and will be splendid.

The Volunteer Extra says:—“We subjoin a statement of the popular vote this year, compiled from the votes polled for the Congressional candidates.” We meet this assertion by a positive and unequivocal denial—it is not true—it is false. The “statement” of the Volunteer is NOT “compiled from the votes polled for the Congressional candidates,” except only in cases where such votes gave them the highest majorities—and even where they do take the Congressional majorities they magnify them from ten to forty per cent beyond the truth. We feel confident that nothing short of the consciousness that they were utterly defeated on the 13th, could induce the Locofoco organ to commit so many and monstrous mistakes.

They Give it up.—They acknowledge in one way that they are whipped, while they try in another way, to figure out a victory in the popular vote. The Volunteer admits that the whigs have carried the Senate, and that the House of Representatives is a tie. Well, now, this of itself, constitutes a pretty considerable triumph. Last year the Locofocos had a majority of three in the Senate and forty in the House—and if, by the admission of the Volunteer the whigs have this year carried the former and made a tie vote in the latter, no reasonable man can doubt that we have done right well. But we repeat it—we

have gained three Congressmen and lost only one—and on a fair test have a majority of the popular vote.

RUFFIANS ARRESTED.—Pinkeye Warner, and some of his associates; comprising the main body of the Lancaster Bullies headed by Jim Cameron, have been arrested, and committed, on serious charges growing out of the riots in Spring Garden on the 13th.

FRAUDS! FRAUDS!—The tremendous Locofoco vote in Philadelphia city and county has been fully explained and accounted for, by the discovery of the most atrocious frauds. Men have been arrested, and an investigation, conducted by W. B. Reed, Esq., is now going on before Judge King, Randall and Jones. Some of Tory Ingersoll's constituents will probably be in the eastern penitentiary before the presidential election. We hope that the Honorable Member himself may not be sent there by mistake.

AWFUL SUICIDE. WILLIAM S. RAMSEY. Member of the present, and member elect of the next Congress, from this Congressional District, (Cumberland; Perry, and Juniata) committed suicide at Barnum's Hotel, Baltimore, on Sunday evening last, by shooting himself. We subjoin the particulars which have reached us:

The Suicide of a Member of Congress.

We regret to state, says the Baltimore American of yesterday, that the Hon. William S. Ramsey, of Carlisle, Pennsylvania, put an end to his existence yesterday evening at Barnum's Hotel in this city, by shooting himself in the right eye. Mr. R. was a member of the present, and recently elected to the next Congress, from the Thirteenth Congressional District of Pennsylvania. The Baltimore Sun says:—“About 5 o'clock on the afternoon of yesterday, he appeared to be quite well, manifesting no unusual excitement or depression of mind, and making some inquiries at the bar relative to the boats and cars to Philadelphia and in an hour afterwards, the report of a pistol was heard in his room. The report attracted first a gentleman stopping at the house and some of the waiters, when he was found speechless and lying near the fire, a pistol lying close by his side; his right hand, except the fore finger, being covered with blood, which had flowed profusely from a wound in the right eye, where the ball had entered. He was recognized by the Hon. Mr. Jenifer, who soon entered the room, and sent for the Hon. Messrs. Howard and Carroll. An inquest was held by Seth Pollard, Esq. coroner; when on examination, the ball was found to have nearly come out at the back of his neck. The verdict of the jury was, that he came to his death by shooting himself with a pistol. He was 38 years of age, and rumor attributes the suicidal act to disappointed affection. Some unopened letters found with him have been taken possession of by his friend Mr. McClair.

OHIO THUNDER!

Old Tip's State is here!! 20,000 Majority for Corwin!! We have received the returns by means of slips and extras from 67 of the 77 counties of OHIO. They show that the office holders have met with the most tremendous rebuke ever given by a suffering and insulted people. The Whig gains are enormous in every county heard from. The majority for Tom Corwin, the wagoner boy, the Harrison candidate for Governor, is already 22,303, and the counties to come in cannot reduce it to less than

20,000.

This majority, when Old Tip takes the field in person, will be increased to 25,000. The members of Congress will stand 13 Whigs to 6 Locofocos. In 1838 they stood 8 Whigs to 11 Locofocos. The Senate will be Whig, and in the House the Locos will scarcely muster a corporal's guard.

the home of General Harrison, gives Corwin a majority of 162. In 1838 Van Buren's majority was 839. In 1838, Shannon's (Loco Foco) majority was 351.

The electoral votes thus certain for Harrison amount to 182—148 being the number necessary to a choice. Certain for Van Buren, 52!

The American Sentinel, a Van Buren paper published in Philadelphia, and for nearly or quite twenty years the organ of the party, claims a majority of but 8,903 in the state.

The Harrisburg Reporter, another Locofoco paper, says they have the popular vote of the state by about 7000.

In both of these estimates, the full vote of Berks county, is counted as a majority, and very liberal sprinklings in other counties, showered into the calculation.

But the Volunteer Extra, which we have been told is pilfered verbatim from that most lying of all lying entities, the Magician, goes to work with more boldness, and without a single blush at the monstrosity of the falsehood, figures out a majority of 11,156—claiming as the Locofoco majority in Berks 2717 more votes than were polled in the county.
