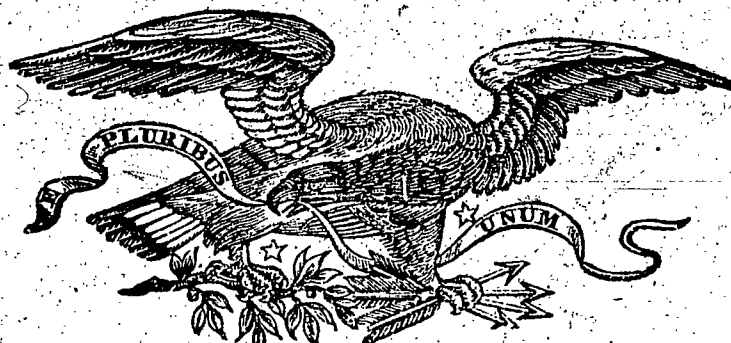
This nicely cooked up dish is fried by a dessert of figure-work, giving Brian Buren, Johnson, and No-White Seal a majority of 881 in the State.
