The steam packet ship Caledonia, Capt. McKellar, was telegraphed at halp-past 9 side the wharf at East Boston, at half-past eleven-but we could not get our papers. by this arrival until nearly 1 o'clock. The Caledonia left Liverpool on the afternoon of the 4th of March, and consequently has been fifteen days and a half on her passage. She brought to this city 28 passengers from Liverpool, and 23 from Halifax and left 13 at Halifax, who left Liverpool in the packet.

The news by this arrival, although embracing the events of twenty-two days, does not appear to be of any considerable importance. There had been no arrival from India, overland-and consequently nothing further has been heard from China. The cotton market was dull-and but little prospect of any improvement.

The packet ship George Washington, arrived at Liverpool on the 3d, with intelligence of the suspension of specie payments by the Bank of the United States. The steam ship Acadia, which left Boston on the 1st of February, arrived in the Mersey, on the 15th-all well.

Drowned!

One of the most appalling disasters at sea ever recorded, occurred in the Irish chano'clock this forenoon, and arrived along nel, on the night of the 19th of February. The New York ship Governor Fenner sailed from Liverpool at noon on that day, with one hundred and twenty-four persons on board-and when off Holyhead, at two hours past midnight, she came in collision with the Dublin steamer Nottingham, which was on its way from Dublin to Liverpool, and the Governor Fenner sunk immediately, only the master and the mate escaping.
