The amount of tax every district must levy to en title itself to its share of State appropriation, is a sun equal to at least 60 cents for every taxable inhabitan in the district, according to the last triennial counter ation made in the spring of 1839. A list of taxable in each district is hereunto appended.

Bistriets that have already accepted the Common School System, and received their share of the appropriation for former years, will on levying the proper amount of tax, be entitled under existing laws to receive for the school year 1842, which commences on the first Monday of next June, one dollar for every taxable.

Districts which have not received any part of the appropriation of former years, but which accept the system for the first time, at the annual election in system for the first time, at the annual election in March next, and levy the proper amount of tax, will under existing laws receive \$4.40 for every taxable in the district in 1835, and \$3.00 for every taxable in 1839, according to the annexed list. These sums, by a resolution passed April 15th 1840, will remain in the State Treasury for the use of non-necepting districts, until the first of November, 1841 and no longer.
