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PRESIDENT TYLER'S ADDRESS.—The address of John Tyler, acting President, to the People of the United States, will be found in another column. It is a document worthy of an attentive perusal, and speaks for itself.

On Thursday last, the Governor returned the Bank Bill to the Legislature, without his signature. He states his objections in an exceedingly long and verbose message, which we give in to-day's paper, for the benefit of those who choose to wade through the document.

It has been a source of great gratification to the supporters of the administration, to witness the cordial co-operation of their political opponents, in paying the proper tribute of respect to our deceased President.

Such an event is calculated to cause different parties to remember that they are still fellow citizens, that they possess common interests and common feelings.

What a solemn spectacle must it not present to citizens of foreign nations. Two political parties, which a few months before were animated by the fiercest hostility towards each other, now unite in their grief, not as in the rotten monarchies of Europe where the people mourn or rejoice by law, but in a sincere, free, spontaneous lamentation for the loss of a beloved ruler.

A HORSE THIEF DETECTED.—We have just been informed that Major JOHN HATFIELD, of our borough, has succeeded in taking, in Frederick, Maryland, a celebrated horse, thief, known as John Russell.
