The trial of Dr. Bradec, the great mail robber, was to have taken place in Pittsburgh last week. It is said that Attorney General Crittenden would attend on the part of the prosecution.

Jacob K. Giffin was lately convicted at Dover, Delaware, of kidnapping, and sentenced to four years imprisonment, a fine of 1500 dollars, and sixty lashes on the bare back!

A "TALL" COUNTY.—When this (Cumberland) county was created, in 1750, it embraced all the lands west of the Susquehanna river, "TO THE SETTING OF THE SUN," (the language of the original deed of purchase from the Five Nations to the Penns.) and "extending from the mouth of the said river northward as far as the Taymantsascha Hills," (Blue Mountains) It was bounded on the south by the South Mountain.

probable that the court will be able to render its judgment in the premises, at the present term, it is thereupon ordered that the defendant be committed to the custody of the Sheriff of the city and county of New York, until the further order of the court.
