The Legislature of 1840-41, the first for sixteen years, has had the firmness or appreciated the necessity, to refuse to make any appropriation to the unfinished lines, and has confined itself strictly to the discharge of pressing and well ascertained debts. Surely there is a novelty in this refusal which deserved attention. Nor can this policy undergo any material change hereafter.

WINE AND INTemperance. It is supposed by many that there is less intemperance in countries where wine is much used, than in others. Coover, the distinguished American writer, once thought the same. But he remarks, that a six months residence in Paris, entirely changed his views in relation to the sobriety of the people. "You will," he observes, "judge of my surprise when I first saw a platoon of Royal Guards—literally a whole platoon of men and horses—the order of their promenade were concerned—staggering drunk, within plain view of the palace of their master. Not a day passed that I did not see men and women in the same condition in the open streets. To convince some persons who doubted this, I took them into the streets and satisfied them of their mistake; and on one of these occasions, we passed thirteen drunken men during the walk of an hour, many of them so far gone as to be unable to walk."

TEMPERANCE.—Never has this great cause been in such effectual progress as at the present time. The subject is one of general conversation in all parts of the city—meetings are being held almost every night, and hundreds are pledging themselves upon the honor of gentlemen to drink no more of that liquid which destroys reason, and causes man, brute-like, to trample down his own as well as his neighbor's rights. The great reformation is most palpably manifested in the person and deportment of many who have lately become members. He who in common parlance was once a loafer—a pensioner upon the bounty of others—always consuming and never producing—penitent and without character, may now be seen genteelly clad, rising by degrees to respectability, seeking employment and earning for it himself an honest living. This, reader, is beyond question the inevitable result of temperance societies and nothing else. While, therefore, so much good can be produced in a little time, and while the means that cause it are so simple, have we not reason, as a moral, as a political, as a commercial and as a free people, to rejoice in the present prospects, and in the anticipation of a more transcendent result?—Balt.
