

The refusal by the U. S. Senate to confirm the appointment of Joseph Ritner, Esq. as Treasurer of the Mint, was occasioned by the impression that he was incapacitated for the duties of his office by blindness. The following letter from his

To the Editor of the Pa. Enquirer: vernor Ritner to the office of Treasurer of the Mint, at Philadelphia, on the alleged ground of incurable loss of sight, compels me as his medical attendant, to trouble you with the following brief statement. Eighteen months ago, I was called on to examboth to exhibit all the symptoms of growing cataracts, but not sufficiently matured to justify, in my opinion, the necessary operation. The eyes were then otherwise sound and unaffected by disease. In February last, I operated on the right eye, successfully at the time; but owing to a visit to Washington by the patient at too early that a membraneous cataract occurred. To remove this, a number of operations became necessary, and five have since been nerformed. The eye is now nearly free from all appearance of opacity, and the sight almost as good as ever. I have no doubt but that in a few weeks, (owing to the vigorous condition of his system and general health) it will be perfectly restored.

I only operated once on the left eye, but been such as to render it, in my opinion, imprudent to touch it-its condition is.

I feel fully justified by an examination I walking the streets without assistance, and writing readily and legibly, with a certainty of still further improvement, be sufficient for that purpose.
