The Result. But we tell the Locos that unless they flatter him with the belief that he is the "biggest toad in the puddle," and give him whatever office he asks, he'll bolt. At the outset, then, make him find his level. Let him, whom the shoe fits, wear it.

McLeod's Trial. This magnificent farce has ended in the acquittal of the prisoner and the disappointment of mobocracy. No mob, riot, or rout followed his discharge from custody.

The question of the right of New York to try McLeod, having been settled by the Supreme Court of the State, he was acquitted solely on the ground of his not being engaged in the affair of the Caroline.

The opinion of jurists, notwithstanding the decision of his honor Judge Cowan, seems to be that it was downright presumption in the State of New York to put this man upon his trial in any of her Courts. His Government had avowed the act as hers, and whether or not McLeod was a participator in the transaction, was no business of New York's. The British Nation was the guilty party and amenable to the Federal Government. Her Majesty's Government and the Judiciary of New York have both done wrong. The secret excursion from Navy Island to Schlosser was piratical; the burning of the Caroline, in common sense terms, arson; the homicide of Durfee in like terms murder, but whether McLeod was in the affair or not, New York had no right, claiming to be a civilized state, to try him.
