Newspaper Law.

Right exactly. The first act of dispayment, if he receive the paper or make use of it, even though he never subscribed for it. His duty in such case is not to take the paper from the office or place where it is left, but to notify the publisher that he does not wish it. If papers are sent to a post office, store, tavern, or other place, and are not taken by the person to whom they are sent, the postmaster, store or tavern keeper, &e., is responsible for the payment, unless he immediately gives notice to the publisher that they are not taken from the office or place where they are sent. place where they are sent. Extract from the Post Office Regulations, page 50,

section 118:

"In every instance in which papers that come to your office are not taken out by the person to whom they are sent, you will give immediate notice of it to the publisher, authing the reasons, it known, why the papers are not taken out."
