Will our readers pardon us for not giving them this week, an abridgement of legislative proceedings? We have not had time for it, and indeed we feel little interest in what they do, for a Pennsylvania legislature is but a humbug. They have as yet settled nothing. Words are too many and action is too little in our legislature.

We are out of humor entirely. Last week we promised our readers two letters from our Washington correspondent, and can insert but one. Cause why? We did not receive the second until it was too late to have it set up. There is something villainously wrong with the mails. Our correspondent's letter is dated the fifth, and post marked the sixth of February, yet it comes not to us until noon of the eighth. This is all wrong. Washington letters and papers ought to come here in one day, and we look to the Post Master General for reform in this matter.

To the interrogatory of our correspondent, we answer "Anti."

The weather, with us, has been playing some queer pranks of late. We have known colder in July, than we had during the greater part of last week. On Friday the heat was absolutely oppressive, and abated but little until Monday, when there came a slight but chilling rain, and then yesterday morning brought with it a boreal blast, ornamented with a snow storm. Before noon, however, the wind was lulled, the snow had gone, the sun was brightly beaming, and one could have walked out without discomfort in nankeen trousers. Then again, about one o'clock, it became so cold as to draw tears.

The Pennsylvania Inquirer copies a paragraph from the New Orleans Bulletin, stating that D. S. KAUFMAN, Esq., former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, had recently a rencontre in the street at Austin, with Mr. Mayfield, a member of the Congress of Texas, which resulted in Mr. Kaufman's receiving a pistol ball in the abdomen. The wound, it was thought, would prove fatal. Mr. Kaufman is a native of our county, and a young man of education and talent. We hope to hear of his recovery.

Sarcastic, humorous and witty, it drew applause from every hearer. We would speak of it more fully, were it not that we think those who did not go to hear it, deserve to know nothing about it. Those who were there have appreciated it.

Mr. Sprole will deliver the second lecture of the course on Tuesday evening next. His subject will be "The true Philosophy." Judging from the known abilities of the lecturer, we predict for him a crowded house.

The Congress of Texas has repudiated the old bonds and notes of the Republic.

We were about preparing for type our own opinion about the conduct of the Southern British towards John Q. Adams, but found that we could not this week crowd it in. We hope to be able in a week or two to talk about it in our own way.

The interest due the 1st instant on the State Debt has not yet been paid.

Late and Interesting from Texas.—By the steamer Neptune, Capt. Rollins, we yesterday received Galveston dates up to Thursday last, the 13th inst., the day that she left Galveston. We regret to state that the Neptune got ashore on Friday evening, 28 hours after leaving Galveston, in a fog, at a point below Donaldson's Bayou.

The news relative to the Santa Fe expedition is of a much more gratifying character than we expected to receive. By the Galveston Advertiser we learn that the French Frigate Sabine had just arrived, bringing dates to the 8th inst., from Tampico, and to the 24th Dec. from Vera Cruz. Com. Dumanvir brought intelligence that the prisoners taken in the Santa Fe expedition had arrived at Mexico, and were well treated, and that the statements of the cruelties practised on them by the way were untrue. Charges would be preferred against them at Mexico, and they would then undergo a trial.

Two Mexican steamers of war, mounting Paixhan guns, and built in England at an expense of \$740,000, were daily expected at Vera Cruz, fully manned and equipped, and were forthwith, on their arrival, destined to blockade the port of Galveston. An army of 50,000 men was also being raised, of which 20,000 were to co-operate with the Navy in the conquest of Texas!

As the Sabine left the port of Vera Cruz, she fell in with two armed brig and one schooner, on their way to blockade that port, supposed to be a part of the Yucatan and Texas Navy.

There are two other French sloops of war and one schooner cruising off the coast. It is, however, expected that the difficulties with France will be amicably arranged.

We hope it may prove true that the Texian prisoners have been well treated, and that the accounts via St. Louis were exaggerated. A few days will bring some positive intelligence. Great excitement with regard to the capture of the Santa Fe Expedition, exists throughout Texas.

The tariff bill had passed the Senate, and it was presumed, would pass the House and become a law without a material alteration. The law goes into operation on the 12th of Feb. It fixes the import duties at an average of about 15 per cent., and requires the payment in gold or silver, or such other liabilities as the government may hereafter issue. The Senate has likewise passed a bill for the collection of direct tax, in the present liabilities of the government, hereby creating at once a mixed currency. Another bill has passed the same body authorizing a new issue of government money, to be called "Exchequer Bills," to the amount of \$150,000, which bills are to be paid out for the support of the government for 1842, and are to be received for custom house dues, as gold and silver.

Major James Riley, formerly member of Congress from Harris county, has been appointed Minister to the United States.
