#### The Election Law.

For the information of votors, we publish the following extracts from the act of Assembly entitled "an Act relating to the Elections of this Commonwealth," passed July 2d, 1839,-relating to the qualifications of officers of the Election the manner of their election, the qualification of voters, &c. It is of great interest to all at this time. The law provides as follows, viz:-

"That overy person, excepting justices of the peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States, or of this State, or of any city of incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer, or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is, or shall be employed under the legislative exeutive or jud ciary department of this State, or the United States, or of any dity or incorporated, district, and also that every member of Congress, and of the state legislature, and of the select or and of the state registatore, and of the select of common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law, incapable of holding or exercising, at the same time the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clork of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no in-Mr. Glay. But a citizen of the United States. who had previously been a qualified voter of this, state, and removed therefrom and returned, and who shall have resided in the election district and paid taxes, aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote after esiding in this state six months: Provided, That the white freemen, citizens of the United State-, between the ages of 21 and 22 years, and having esided in this state one year and in the election listrict ten days as aforesaid, shall be entitled to rote, although they shall not have paid taxes."
