Great Snow Storm.

Militia Expenses.

A bill has been reported in Senate, by Mr. Darsie, providing for certain reductions in the Militia expenses of this Commonwealth. It reduces the pay of the Brigade Inspectors and other officers, and also the fees-repeals all previous acts authorizing the payment of money's out of the Treasury for militia expenses, and requires the expenses to be confined to the amount of fines and forfeitures collected. The last report of the Auditor General shows that more than \$33,000 have been expended during the last year for the support of the militia, while only thirteen del'ars and some odd cents have been collected in the shape of fines and forfeitures
