

REBELLION OF MILLERISM. Rev. Mr. THOMAS, of this borough, delivered a lecture on Saturday evening last in the Court House, to a very large assemblage of persons, in opposition to the views of the end-of-the-world lecturers. Mr. Thomas's lecture was particularly devoted to exhibiting the erroneous interpretation of the prophecies of Daniel, and the twenty-four chapters of Matthew, upon which the Millerites base their predictions.
