Brutal Murder near Harrisburg. One of the most atrocious murders that ever stained the annals of our country, was committed near Harrisburg, on Friday morning, the 14th inst. The State Capital, Gazette, of that morning, says, just as our paper was going to press, our town was thrown into the most intense excitement from the fact, that a most diabolical murder had been committed almost within its precincts, in open day, and the perpetrators have thus far escaped the most vigilant efforts of our citizens and police to detect them.

On Thursday evening two individuals were arrested in this county on suspicion of having committed the murder, but we learn that on an examination of them in Harrisburg on Saturday, no satisfactory evidence being elicited, one of them was discharged. The other was remanded to jail for further examination. It is to be hoped the perpetrators of this foul and atrocious deed will yet be discovered. A reward of \$500 is offered for their discovery and conviction.
