And, if he attends twee a week, which he ought to do, especially in the summer season, (when the labor of himself and team are most needed at hone,) it will occupy the whole time of himself and two horses and expenses on the road, merely to renable him to sell his produce. No business can or ought to stand such a tax upon it. Those who live still further off, have to take their produce to the stores in their neighborhood, and when Butter is selling in Philadelphia market at 25 cents per lb., they sell to the stores at 124 cents, and receive Dry Goods, Groceries or other store goods in payment, at high prices.

In order to remedy this difficulty, a large stone market-house has been erected in Philadelphia, near the Collector's office on the Columbia rail road, with glazed windows and dry cellars, called the "Car Market" from the circumstance of having a branch from the Columbia rail road running through it so that Farmers can bring their produce by the morning train of ears, sell out, and return by the evening cars, or they can come to market by the afternoon line and return the next day, where their residence is 50 or 60 miles from the city.

Even where they reside 100 miles off, they can come to market one day and return the next with very little expense or fatigue; thus in a few hours converting all their produce into gold-or-silver, or notes of specie-paying banks, (there are no othes in general circulation in Philadelphia at present,) and this good money will be paid to them in the city where they can buy their dry goods, groceries, &c., at first hands as cheaply as the country merchants can do, and thus save as much as will pay their toll on the rail road; so that, whatever is the difference between the vricesat home and in Philadelphia, will be a clear profit. As producers will thus be enabled to sell cheaper than those who reside near the city, (who pay more for their farms, and have to bring their produce by wagon and horses,) purchasers will go there, especially in these "hard times" when every body feels disposed to save all they honorably can.

There is another class of Farmers who live too far

There is another class of Farmers who live too far off from the rait road to send their produce to market in this way, who would bring, it to the stores or depots along the rait road, should such be established, and sell to storekeepers or dealers of produce along the line, who would always be prepared to buy and forward it to the ear market.

It is desirable that suitable persons should establish such depots for the reception and forwarding of such produce, either on commission or on own account.
