



By moon our streets and public square were filled and calculating that the lower current would carwith countless throngs of gay and happy heings, ry me into the city; but I found on nearing the jostling, pushing, squeezing, laughing, talking, eating, drinking-all exhileration, exoitement and enjoyment.

Meantime, within the amphitheatre which had been temporarily crected in the public square for the purpose, and with a considerable crowd collected around him to examine the process, the Eronaut was busily engaged in the work of inating his balloon. By two o'clock this had been completed, and preparations for the ascension commenced. The inflated prostat moved to and fro in its aspirations to cleave the air and soar aloft. The signal at length was given-the venturous Æronaut took his place in the car-the cords were unlossed which confined him to the earth, and with the bound of an arrow he shot upward from the midst of the multitude to soar in a purer and more ethercal sphere. , The hearty acclaim of a thousand voices rent the air as he rapidly-ascended from the view of the spectators, and ascended higher and still higher into the boundless sea of exure, until at last the im mense balloon seemed to the eye "no bigger than 's man's hand," and was finally lost to view en tirely. The assemblage then quietly dispersed, our visiters prepared to depart to their homes and in a few hours after our town had resumed its usual staid and orderly aspect. So ended a great day in Carlisle; one which will be long re mbered with satisfaction by all who shared in the exciting scenes of the occasion.
