We fear that the cause of Morality, Temperance and good order is sadly retrogading in our county; a fact that we hope will arouse every friend of humanity to renewed and stronger efforts to give a wider diffusion of the rich blessings of Morality and Temperance, and stem the tide of vice and immorality that seems to be sweeping over not only this but every other rection of our_country.

Their condition in China, says the Gazette, like most of the numerous and unfor tunate blind in that wast empire-was one of great destitution and exposure—one was carried on the back of its parent and put down in the strents to sing its little beggar songs and when seen by the Christian missionary, its little limbe were frightfully swollen and lacorated by the brutal treatment of its unnatural father.
