The Township Elections. From Washington. Or The Cabinet is again organized by the nomination and confirmation of John C. Calhoun, as Secretary of State, and John Y. Mason, of Va. as Secretary of the Navy.

In the U. S. Senate a debate is going on, on a joint resolution to give notice to the British Government of the desire of our Government to annul the article of the treaty of 1818 for the joint occupation of the Oregon territory.

On Wednesday last, Mr. Dromgoole, of Va. reported a bill to the House of Representatives, to repeal the sections of the Act of July, 1842, now in force, providing for the distribution of the proceeds of the sales of the Public Lands among the States; on this the previous question was called and a vote taken in spite of all remonstrance, and the bill passed by a vote of 113 to 61!

Immediately after the repeal of the Distribu tion bill, Mr. Dromgoole, of Va., reported a bill for the collection, sufe-keeping, transfer and dis ment of the public revenues-in other words, re viving the Sub-treasury. Both of these bills will receive their quietue in the Senate.




