Resolutions have been passed in both House instructing our members of Congress to sustain the present Tariff. The resolutions are not as strong in favor of Protection as the Whigs desired. Messrs, Heck and Eckels, who seem to vote with equal facility on either side of a question, voted in favor of these resolutions, not withstanding their former vote against Protection !-A resolution was introduced into the House lest week, instructing our Senators at Washington to oppose any treaty for the annexation of Texas to the Union. These resolutions the Locos are trying to shuffle off, but they are not yet disposed of Messrs. Heck and Eckels voted invariably against the resolutions; thus avowing themselves in favor of Texas and Slavery! A bill is under consideration compelling the Tide Water Canal Company to receive their notes for tolls, equal to one-fifth part thereof. It will likely pass.

On Saturday last, the Appropriation bill as giver above, passed Committee of the Whole, in the House, without amendment. In this bill the appropriation to Common Schools is \$140,000 less than last year, and by a resolution of the House the fund set apart to the credit of the non-accept ing districts has been withdrawn. It is likely that bills for the sale of the Main Line and the Delaware Canal will pass at this session.
