NATIVE AMERICAN Meeting.

We have been requested to publish the proceedings of a Native American meeting, held last week in Mechanicsburg, which we learn was largely attended by both "Democrats" and Whigs. The proceedings related us at top late in hour for publication this week, but shall have a place in our next. Their publication may be noticed at liberty to refuse compliance with the reasonable request of a respectable body of citizens.

Loss by Fire.

We regret to learn that the dwelling house of Richard Woods, Esq. of Dickenson township was entirely consumed by fire on Thursday night last. The fire originated in the Kitchen which was enveloped in flames before being discovered, and so rapidly did the fire extend over the entire building that the inmates, themselves with difficulty escaped, saving nothing but a few articles of clothing. The loss is estimated at \$4000, on which there was an insurance of \$1000.

We cannot too strongly recommend residents in the country to avail themselves of the means of insurance now so advantageously offered by the different Insurance Companies here and at a distance. The loss above stated furnishes a striking instance of the short-sighted policy of neglecting insurance, or having it to so small an amount.

Celebration of the 4th.

The Whig in town had a glorious and lively gathering on Saturday evening last, at Gen. Foulke's Hotel, to make arrangements for a celebration of the 4th of July. John Reed, Esq. addressed the meeting at some length, giving most encouraging intelligence respecting the progress of the cause of CLAY and MARCY in this State, as derived from his correspondence as chairman of the Whig State Committee, L. G. Brandreth, Esq. also spoke warmly and eloquently in behalf of our distinguished candidate, eliciting as he proceeded the lively applause of the meeting. The committees appointed by the meeting will be found in to-day's paper.

Mr. Polk's "Volunteers" present a correspondence between Mr. E. D. Nutt, President of a Native American Association in Philadelphia, and Andrew Miller, of that city, the remark that Mr. Nutt "formerly resided in this borough and is now out and out Whig and that Mr. Miller is a Democrat." Several gentlemen have called upon us to say that Mr. Nutt was never known here as a Whig, or if he was, he kept it so quiet that the party did not know it. This is a very poor way of making the Whig and Native American parties "identical!"

Mr. Miller's letter is undoubtedly an eloquent production, but there are many persons who think that if he had commenced his narrative with the first day & right instead of the third, he might have found in the breaking up of a public meeting for the purpose of the shooting down of citizens engaged in the peaceful exercise of their Constitutional rights—in the trampling of the American flag in the dust—materials for as deeply colored a picture as the one he has portrayed. But that would not suit the views of the demagogues who are agitating this subject for the sake of political capital.

We copied a paragraph, week before last from the "Emancipator," an abolition paper, in which Mr. Polk was classed as a "Bastard." The editor of the "Emancipator" has written to us to say that his article was not written by our colleague, whether it was not, warranted by subsequent information, and may therefore stand as untrue. We are glad of it. It is but from our desire in opposition to Mr. Polk of any other candidate, that we have no objection to him. We hope no one will do if skilling after him in every step he takes in his unprincipled conduct.

We observe the "Volunteers" ask with a dubious smile, "Is Mr. Polk not the man?" The Whig in town did not "Emancipate" him.
