### The Volunteer's Last Card.

The Whigs of the county must be on the look-out for lying "extras" to be thrown among the people in thick profusion, from now until Tuesday. Let the people be on their guard! But there is no article in the "Mill-boy" at all which speaks in disrespect of the mechanics and working men. ### POLK AND CLAY'S LETTERS!

It is a well known fact that the Tariff Democrats of Dickinson township in this county, addressed a letter on the 20th of July last, to James K. Polk, enquiring whether he was friendly to the present Tariff. The following is the only reply we have heard of:

MR. POLK'S ANSWER.

The honest democrats of Dickinson not being able to understand such penmanship, and being left in as much doubt as ever relative to the import of these few lines from Mr. Polk, met on the 30th of August and addressed the same inquiries to Mr. CLAY. His answer is as follows:

MR. CLAY'S ANSWER.

ASHLAND, 9th Sept. 1844.

GENTLEMEN—I this day received your letter, addressing two enquiries to me—"1st. Are you in favor of the Tariff act of 1842?"—and "2d. Would you if elected, support that act as it is, without modification, or would you be in favor of modifying it?"

I have so often, gentlemen, expressed my opinion in favor of the Tariff of 1842, that the only regret I feel is that you should deem it at all necessary to request any renewed expression of it. Nevertheless, I take pleasure in complying with your request, in saying that I am of opinion that the operation of the Tariff of 1842 has been eminently salutary; that I am decidedly opposed to its repeal; that I should regard its repeal as a great national calamity, and that I am unaware of the necessity of any modification of it. I am therefore opposed alike to its repeal or modification. A fixed and stable policy is what the country now most needs, and I sincerely hope that the Tariff of 1842 may be maintained, and thus afford a security for that desideratum.

### Tax-Payers Look Here!

We learn from Western papers that out of seventy five delegates to the Locofoco Convention at Pittsburg, who left Johnston, Cambria county, on the 10th of September, SIXTY are employed on the Public Works, and paid out of the Treasury of the State.

The average wages of the above disinterested patriots is one dollar and fifty cents per day, being from eighty seven and a half cents to two dollars and fifty cents per day. Allowing them to be absent six days, the State will have to pay the pipes, to the amount of at least FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS, for which no services will have been rendered. This is one of the most striking illustrations with which we have yet been furnished; and adds another to the many thousand reasons why the PEOPLE should rise in their might and disperse the hordes of corrupt speculators who have plundered the Public Treasury for years past, and are still fattening upon the spoils.
