MOVEMENTS IN WASHINGTON.
The operations of the gallitine have commenced at Washington, and political decapitation is likely to be the order of the day for some time. A large number of removals have already been made in the more important offices, and this week it is said that to be assigned for a general clearing out of the clerkships of the various departments. As was expected, Mr. Penrose, Solicitor of the Treasury, has been superseded—his successor is a Mr. Seth Barton, of Louisiana, and the Government will be fortunate if it secures in the new appointment as able and accomplished an officer as Mr. Penrose. We learn that there was a deposition for the office of Solicitor, particularly from Pennsylvania, which furnished almost a score of applicants. Among the disappointed are Judge Hepburn and Colonel McClure, of this borough.

Some of the locofoe papers are bellowing out most lustily for a general sweep of the old officers, just as if they were afraid Mr. Polk would be found wanting in such an inclination. There is no good reason to fear any unwillingness on his part to gratify them to the extent of his power, if not to the full extent of their furnished speculations. He has the right kind of men in his Cabinet for that. It is said Cave Johnson has declared that not a single Post Office in the United States shall be held by any but a loco fofo, and he is the very man to carry out such a determination. But of course the Administration does not intend to perpetuate any such thing as "proscription for opinion's sake."

THE METHODIST CONFERENCES.
The two divisions of the Methodist Church, the "Episcopal" and the "Protestant," each keep holding their annual Conferences within the last month in Baltimore. The Protestant adjourned on Saturday, the 22d of March.
