Dreadful Earthquake at the city of Mexico. The New Orleans Bee has been furnished by a merchant of that city with the Vera Cruzano of the 12th inst., containing the account of a awful earthquake which devastated the city of Mexico on the 7th inst.

At the moment we write, says the Siglo (of the city of Mexico) of the 8th, the inhabitants of the capital of the Republic are still under the influence of the horrors excited by the earthquake of yesterday.

Yesterday at 52 minutes past 3 o'clock P. M., the oscillations began, slight at first and then stronger.

We were by chance upon the great square at the time, and we witnessed a spectacle not easily forgotten.

It is impossible to ascertain the destruction. Not a house or a door but bears the marks of this terrible calamity.
