The declarations made in Parliament by the leaders of both the great parties, on the question of British title to Oregon, and the duty and determination of the crown to resist anything like an attempt to take possession of the Territory by our Government, has led to a pretty general belief that war between the United States and Great Britain is inevitable. One thing, however, is perfectly clear—that two Governments are directly at issue, on the question of title, and President Polk, on the one side, and Sir Robert Peel, on the other, have so defined the position and determination of their respective countries, as to leave but little hope of the continuance of peace, but by mutual concessions and re-tractions.
