The brig "Titl," arrived yesterday norning from Havans, which place she left on the 10th inst. By this vessel we have received Havanna files to the day of her departure. The only news of imporlance brought by the "Titil" relates to Boyd, went to the farm house of James Mexican affairs. The British Steamer Thames arrived at Havana on the 6th, bout a mile out of the borough, and while from Vera Cruz, having left the Mexican there committed one of the most cold port on the 1st inst. The intelligence rought by her is eight days later from Vera Cruz, and nine days later from the city of Mexico. The papers we have seen assert that the Executive of Texas has reopened negotiations with Mexico in regard to the recognition of the independence of the former State. It would appear from these advices that President Jones, with the help of the English and French embassies, has got the Mexican Government to entertain the negotiation, upon the understanding that Annexation should not take place.
