## TERMS REDUCED!

One dollar seven cents a year  
and no Postage!

On the 1st of July next, the new Postage Law, passed at the last session of Congress, will go into effect. Under its provisions, newspapers will circulate free of postage within thirty miles of the place where they are printed.—This will be a reduction of 52 cents to each subscriber.—The "Herald and Expositor" can afford that date to send to any person in Cumberland county, *free of postage*. To those who subscribe for the "Herald," and pay *for it in advance*, we will furnish it for \$1.75, thus making a reduction on the whole of 77 cents. This is no trifling sum, and we hope will be an incentive to persons who do not now take the newspaper to subscribe for it immediately. Subscribers to the "Herald" who are in arrears, and who settle up and pay a year in advance, will also be furnished with the paper for \$1.75 cents. Those who do not pay in advance will of course have to pay the old price.

Porter, Esq., comprises the different Post Offices in Cumberland and the adjoining counties, which are within thirty miles of our place of publication and to which the "Herald" may be hereafter forwarded *free of postage*.
