### Its Practical Operations!

In reterring to the Secretary's report the President says that it will be seen by that that a considerable portion of the additional amount of revenue required may be raised - by a modification of the rates of duties. High duties on many articles, he says, totally exelude them from importation, while the im-cortation of others is greatly diminished thereby ... By reducing the duties to " the revenue standard," it is not doubted that a large amount of articles on which they are imposed would be imported, and a corresponding amount of revenue be received from this

That is to say, remarks 'Oliver Oldschool,' if you will only tompt foreigners to send their goods here and sell them to us, and cut out our own, articles, we can raise from twenty o thirty thousand for the government out of every hundred thousand we pay the foreigner. In other words, we must pay the foreigner from, seventy-five to eighty thousand dollars, in order that the government may get twenty or twenty-five thousand ! Upon "the revenue standard" system, we must import one hundred millions of dollars worth of goods, tha we can just as well manufacture at home, and thereby keep the money at house, in order that government may raise twenty millions of revenue! What profound statesmanship.


