Table with columns for Number of paupers in the Institution 1st January, 1847, of which 26 were colored and 7 out-door paupers, 170. Number admitted up to 31st December, 1847, of which 13 were colored and 2 born in the house, 170. Making the whole number through the year, 340. Of which 19 died, 10 children bound out, 93 eloped, 120 discharged, and 8 out-door paupers.

Whole number supported 1st January, 1848. Of those remaining in the Poor House 31st December, 1847, there are—Males 13, of which 12 are colored and 1 white, 89. Females 39, of which 11 are colored and 28 white, 128. And 8 out-door paupers, of which 2 are colored and 6 white, 8. Averages number per day through the year: Males 80, of which 12 are colored and 68 white, 107. Females 99, of which 11 are colored and 88 white, 110. There is as near as can be ascertained under 1 year: 1 from 1 to 5; 4 from 5 to 10; 8 from 10 to 20; 10 from 20 to 30; 15 from 30 to 40; 16 from 40 to 50; 15 from 50 to 60; 8 from 60 to 70; 10 from 70 to 80; 7 from 80 to 90; 1 from 90 to 100; 1 above 100.
