WEATHER AND CROPS .- After a protracted dry season we have been visited by a copious rain, during the last three days. Vegetation and the crops which had p eviously been very backward may now be expected to take a fresh start.

From the Californians .-- We received vesterday two letters from Esq. Fleming, of the Carlis's party, but too late for their insertion entire. They are dated Kansas, Missouri, which place they reached on the 11th of April, having left St. Louis on the 6th. All of the party were well. There were no cases of Cholera or other sickness among the emi' grants at that place. We quote the conclusion of the letter:

"We arrived at the town of Kansas, a new place located a bout 20 miles by water above Independence, on Wednesday the 11th, about one o'clock, where we debarked. We had shipped fire St. Joseph's, a place one hundred soiles further up the river, but were induced to stop here. We cat our meals at a layern and lodge in a reason technical house. and lodge in a vacant school house.

Myself and another of our company were deputed to go to "Independence," twelve miles by land, to buy mules, &c, and arrived there to day (13th.) We find it quite a fine town containing a number of good houses of brick, a population of some 2000 inhabitants, and several very respectable, public houses, smercantile establishments and mechanical establishments. Abandant provision has been made here to supply all nacessaries for cmi-grants, probably on as good terms as at any place we have been in. I learn upon inquiry, that there are in and about this place from 1500 to 2000 emigrants on their way to California. As this is the great depot for the emigrants, you can form some idea of the enthis spring. I doubt not that from 4000 to 5000 will number all that will go from all

points on the Missouri river.

We hope in a few days to have our teams organized and to encamp for a few days near move on our journey.
