NINEVEH !- Our first page this week contains a notice of a new work by an English antiquarian, Mr. LAYARD, accompanied with extracts from it, which our readers will find deeply interesting. The discoveries made by Mr. Layard are indeed wonderful. In a period of eighteen months beginning with November, 1846, and ending with April, 1847, Mr. Layard disentembed various palaces and other edifices of the Assyrians, and proved beyond cavil from paintings found on the walls, that not only was that people highly civilized, but that the arch, believed to be a comparatively modern discovery, was in use among them. Beautiful glass was also discovered. He traced out the site, by means of its ruins of the famous city of Ninevel. When we remember that the capital of the Assyrlans was destroyed six hundred years before the Christian era, and only one hundred and fifty after Rome is supposed to have been founded, we begin to form some conceptions of the antiquities of these ruins-for the latest of them are at least twen--tyrive limited years old. Even when Zanophon marched over this plain, during his celebrated retreat of the ten thousand Greeks, in the year B. C. 400, every trace of Nineveh I ad disappeared, its name had been forgotten in the very-neighborhood-where it had once flourished. The great capital of "three days' journev" had become a ruin, as the prophet fore. told, she was laid waste, and there was none to be moan her.

CHECKED IN HIS CAREER .-- One day last week a young man who had been sporting about town for some time previous, hired a pair of horses and light wagon at Hilton's L.v. ery Stable, to take as he said a short drive .-But as he did not return that day nor the next, Mr. Hilton concluded that his property was gone. In a day or two after he received a telegraphic despatch from Bultimore, stating that the young man had been arrosted and he could recover his property. It appears that some two weeks since this young man robbed the Telegraph office at Baltimore of about \$50 in money. Being suspected he left the City and came to Carlisle, where he lived well and loomed large until his funds got low. He then hired the horses of Mr. Hilton and made his way back to Batimore. The police officers, who were on the look-out for him, arrested him soon after his return, when, as the Baltimore Sun' says, he made confession of the foregoing facts. The young rogue's name is George G. Green, and he is about 21 years of age. " He was committed to prison for trial.

PHILADELPHIA ART UNION .- The Annual Distribution of the Philadelphia Art Union took place last Monday evening a week. From the annual report it appeared that the number of subscribers was 1,206, and the aggregate receipts \$6,035-deducting from this commissions, the cost of the elegant engraving of Ruth and Boaz, and other expenses, the sum of \$1,417,33 was left to be distributed. This sum was divided into 40 prizes or certificates ranging from \$100 to \$40-which were distributed by lot. This was the first annual distribution of the Union. It is still far behind its flourishing contemporary of New York, but has made an suspicious beginning.

THE GOLD DOLLAR -The gold dollars have made their appearance in Philadel' phia, and one of them, at least, in Carlisle. -They are a beautiful coin, but much too small to be popular, being at least one fourth less in size than our half-dimes. We'll take 'em however, for subscription, thankful for even such small favors. One side is decorated with the head of Liberty and the stars of the republic. On the reverse are the words "United States of America." with "1 Dollar, 1849."
