#### From the Working Far CHEMISTRY AND AGRICULTURE.

Seeds and plants are endowed by na ture with various powers, and among them are to be found the nower of absorbing certain compound materials at a their termini, and of discharging such parts as may not become necessary to the new combinations formed.

Among the most important of the ma terials so absorbed may be enumerated Carbonic Acid and Ammonia.

Before describing the facts arising out of the absorption of these materials, it may be proper to describe their sources of production, properties, &c. &c. thus: Carbonic Acid Gas simply means charcoal or carbon, dissolved in the gas called

Suppose a load of wood or a ton o coal, to be burned in an ordinary fire place, and let us trace what becomes of it during and after the process of com-Ninety-five per cent, of dry wood and coal is carbon, and at high temperature carbon is soluble in oxygen gas, (a [component of water and of the atmosphere,) and when so dissolved, -forms carbonic-acid gas, a colorless gas, which at the temperature of the armosphere, is much heavier, but when heated is expanded one five-hundredth part of its bulk for every degree of heat added, and in consequence, when resulting from combustion, is specifically lighter than the surrounding atmosphere, and for the same reason that a piece of cork rises in water (because it is lighter than its bulk of water,) it ascends the chimney, on reaching the top its heat leaves the gas, and from its 'oss again contracts; becoming heavier than the atmosphere and

sinks to the surface of the carth. Here we will leave for the present our carbonic acid arising from combustion.

All vegetation matters undergoing the progress of fermentation or decay, give as their principal ultimate result, carbonic acid gas. Thus it may be seen that the vegetable products of the earth are all re-converted by some or all these processes into carbonic acid, and are again sent out on the face of nature to supply the materials for new growth.

To understand clearly the operation of its absorption by plants, the neguliar pro-

its absorption by plants, the peculiar propensities of this gas; the ultimate parti-cles of this gas are so minute that they pass with ease through any substance not vitrified like glass.

Thus in a church or lecture room, containing one thousand persons, each person, by breathing, renders twelve gailons of air per minute incapable of supporting animal life; and were it not for the fact that the carbonic acid gas thus formed, could pass out between the ultimate particles of stone, wood, &c. composing the walls, the audience would die-for the same reason that a quart of peas will run through or between the spaces of a barrel of apples, or a quart of water between the spaces of a barrel of peas, the ultimate particles of carbonic acid (being smaller) will pass between the ultimate particles of most other substances. According to the experiments of M. de Saussure and others, the atmosphere contains one twenty-five hundredth of its bulk of carbonic acid gas, and water is capable of receiving under the ordinary pressure of the utmosphere for the superiority of BLINDS, with conformed confidence in his manufacture,) asks the

When the sap is rising rapidly in a grape vine, cut off a main branch, or the of the vine, and place over this cut an India rubber bottle of great strength, (say capable of sustaining a pressure of fifteen pounds per square inch.) compress the nir from this bottle, and bind the neck firmly around with a flat ligament, so as not to compress the capillary tubes of the vine,) and the result of this will be that the bag will gradually distend, and eventually burst; or if its contents be analyzed, it will be found to contain water and carbonic acid. Or if a plant be placed in water containing lime in solution, the water will soon be rendered turbid, the cartonic acid not yet appro-priated by the plant, but resident unal-

sumed as food or passing into decay from other causes, yields this gas, and to Liebig we are brincipally indebted for a knowledge of the fact that rain water contains anomonia.
