> DICKINSON COLLEGE. "COMMENCEMENT."

The annual commencement of this ancient Institution was celebrated on Thursday last, with much colut. We have never seen a larger attendance of spectators, particularly from a distance, and d subt not all falt richly repaid by the interesting exercises of the occasion.

On the day, preceding Commencement the usual addresses were delivered before the Literary Societies, and attracted large nudiences. Mr. Tyson is well known in the literary world as a leading member of the Pennsylvania Historical Society, and his address on this occasion, besides being a production of high polish and elegance, showed how thoroughly he has mastered the great subject of History. His address included a review of the style and pecultarities of leading Histo-rians, and although his opinions were doubtless disagreed with in some cases by portions of his


