ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, it is by an act of the General Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth," it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within this Commonwealth, to give public notice of general Elections, and instructions to be observed;

1. The officers to be elected.

2. Designate the place at which the election is to be held.

3. JAMES HOFFER, High Sheriff of the county of Cumberland, do hereby make known and give this public notice to the electors of the county of Cumberland that on the **SECOND TUESDAY OF OCTOBER, NEXT**, (being the 5th day of the month,) the General Election will be held in the several election districts established by law in said county, at which time they will vote by ballot for the several officers hereinafter named, viz—

ONE PERSON
for Caval Commissioner of the State of Pennsylvania.

2 PERSONS
to represent the county of Cumberland in the House of Representatives of Pennsylvania.

ONE PERSON
for Sheriff of the county of Cumberland.

ONE PERSON
for Treasurer of the county of Cumberland.

ONE PERSON
for Commissioner of the county of Cumberland.

ONE PERSON
for Director of the Poor and of the House of Employment of the county of Cumberland.

2 PERSONS
for Auditors, to settle the public accounts of the County of Cumberland—One to serve 3 and the other to serve 2 years.

ONE PERSON
for Coronor of the county of Cumberland.

The said election will be held throughout the country, as follows:

The election in the election district composed of the borough of Carlisle and the townships of North Middleton, South Middleton, Lower Dickinson, Lower Frankford and West Pennsborough will be held at the Court House, in the borough of Carlisle.

The election in the election district composed of Silver Spring township, will be held at the public house of George Dury, in Hegewisch in said township.

The election in the election district, passed the 21st day of April, A. D. 1846, the election is the election district composed of Hampden township, will be held at the house formerly occupied by H. Brinkley in said township.

At the same time, when the election is held of Lisburn and a part of Allen township, known as the Lisburn District, shall herein after hold their election in the public house now occupied by John G. McLean.

The election in the election district composed of East Pennsborough township, will be held at the house now occupied by S. Remlinger, at the west end of Main Street, in said township.

The election in the election district composed of New Cumberland, will be held at the public house of W. H. Boil, in the borough of New Cumberland.

The election in the election district composed of part of Allen township, which election was heretofore held at the public house of Wm. Heck in the borough of New Cumberland, will be held at the public house of George Heck, now occupied by Ward Clegg.

The election in the election district composed of part of Allen township, not included in the New Cumberland, George Heck and Lisburn election districts, will be held at the public house of David Shuey, in the intersection of Main and Market streets, in the borough of New Cumberland.

The election in the election district composed of the borough of Mechanicsburg, will be held at the public house of John Hoover, in said borough.

The election in the election district composed of Monroe township, will be held at the public house of John Paul, in Churchtown, in said township.

The election in the election district composed of Upper Newville, in the intersection of Main and Market streets, will be held at the public house of David Shuey, in the intersection of Main and Market streets, in the borough of Newville.

The election in the election district composed of Hope township, will be held at the School House in said township, in said town.

The election in the election district composed of the borough of Shippensburg, will be held at the public house of John Beuck, in said borough.

The election in the election district composed of Mifflin, Union, Franklin, Big Spring, and that part of Newton and Southhampton townships, will be held at the public house of John Beuck, in said election district, Beuck being mentioned, will be held at the Brick School House, in the borough of Shippensburg.

The election in the election district composed of Hope township, will be held at the School House in said township, in said town.

The election in the election district composed of the borough of Shippensburg, Shippensburg township, and that part of Southhampton township, included in the Union election district, will be held at the Council House, in the borough of Shippensburg.

The election in the election district composed of the county of Cumberland, bounded by the following lines, will be held at the School House in the Adams townships, these along the line between the townships of Dickinson and Newton to the turnpike road, thence along said turnpike to Centreville School House, said turnpike in Southampton township, the school house in the town of the Bottom Run, to Heybuck's including Heybuck's Farm, thence a straight direction to the Saw Mill belonging to the heirs of George Clever, thence along Kryshee's run to the Adams County line, thence along the line of the Adams County line of beginning, he and the same it hereby declares, a new and separate election district, the election to be held at the public house of John Beuck, in Leesburg, in Southhampton township.

Notice in Horbury Given.

That every person, excepting Judges of the Peace, or other officers, or persons entitled to the emoluments or profit or trust under the United States, or of this State, or any city or incorporated district; whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer, or agent, who is to be sent to any of the said districts, or to any of the military departments of this State, or of the United States, or of any city, or of any incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress, or of the State Legislature, and of the Select of County Commissioners, or of any other member of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time, the office or appointment of Judge, inspector, or clerk of any election, or of any other office, or post, so that no Inspector, Judge, or other officer, or clerk of election, shall be eligible to be then voted for.

And the said act of Assembly, entitled an act relating to elections of this Commonwealth, passed July 1, 1839, is hereby published.

That the Inspector and Clerk shall remain at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the district to which they respectively belong, until 9 o'clock in the morning of the Second Tuesday of October, and each of the Inspectors shall appoint one or more clerks, so that no qualified voter shall be denied his right to vote.

In case the person who shall have received the highest number of votes for Inspector, shall not appear at the place of holding the election, the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes for Judge at the next preceding election shall not be "Inspector" in his place, nor the person who shall have received the highest number of votes for Clerk, so that the person elected shall not attend, the person elected shall appoint an Inspector in his place; and in case the Inspector or Judge shall not attend, then the Inspector, or Clerk, or both, shall be entitled to a sum of votes which shall appoint a judge in his place, or if necessary shall continue in the ward for the space of one hour at the time fixed by law for the election, and until such time as all persons having a sufficient number of votes shall be present at the place of election, or such other matters in relation to the assessment of voters as the said Inspectors or Clerks may direct.

No person shall be qualified to vote in this election as aforesaid, but a white freeman of the age of twenty-one years or more, who shall have resided in this State at least one year, and in the election district in which he or she is to vote at least two days immediately preceding the election, and within two years paid a State or county tax, which shall have been assessed at least ten dollars per month, or more. But a citizen of the United States, who has resided in this State, and removed the voter from time to time requires.
