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## OREGON TERRITORY.

Oregon, notwithstanding the fact that she is a new territory, and a great quantity of her land has been acquired by the United States, is a recent country, ordered by Governor Lane, shows that it contained in April last a population as follows:

Males, under 21 years,	3,601
Males, 21 years and over,	2,533
Females of all ages,	2,637
Foreigners,	263
Total,	9,134

In this census, half-breeds, aborigines and Hittowites are not included; and a correspondent of the New-York Courier, writing of Oregon territory, says "It may be fairly estimated that it has less than five tenths of the population of the Rocky Mountains."

The city of Oregon is situated just before the falls of Willamette, principally on the East side of the river, where a town has been gradually laid out, and about one hundred dwellings erected, inhabited by four hundred souls. Catholics, Congregationalists, Methodists, Baptists and Presbyterians have their respective places of worship—schools have been established and two newspapers (The Oregon Spectator and The Free Press) were published last year. The breaking out of the "gold fever" checked for a time the growth of the city, and caused a suspension of the papers, but an effort is made for a removal of The Spectator, and eventually the city will take another start and progress rapidly.

The extensive water power has been improved by the erection of an engine and mill, owned by the late Governor, Abernethy, and Dr. McLaughlin. One of the saw and grist mills was lately sold by the first named gentleman to a company for \$30,000.

An election for a delegate to Congress had been held, and the Hon. S. R. Thurston chosen by a majority of seventy votes over all other candidates. Gov. Lane has divided the territory into judicial districts, and assigned the Judges their respective jurisdictions: District No. 1, the Columbia; Judge Bryant; District No. 2, West of the Willamette and south of the Columbia, to Judge Pratt; District No. 3, lying north of the Columbia, no Judge appointed. The courts in Judge Bryant's district commence in August, and those in Judge Pratt's district in September. An election for members to a territorial legislative council had taken place, but no time of meeting was named.
