"ARMS OF THE UNITED STATES." Although the study of heraldy may not be very amusing to our republican readers, yet, as the eagle, with extended wing angresping the arms of war and the olive of peace, is constantarms of war and the olive of peace, is constantly presented to our eye in soms way or other, it may not be uninteresting to give a history of and an explanation of the Arms of our country. In June, 1782, when Congress, was about to form, an armorial device for a seal for the Union, Charles Thomson, Esq. the Secretary, with the Hon. Arthur Lee and E Boudinot, members of Congress, called on Mr. War. Barton, and consulted him on the occasion. The great seal, for which Mr. Barton furnished these gentlemen with devices, was adopted by Congress on the 20th of June, 1782. The device is as follows:

The motto alludes to the Union. The pales in the Arms are kept closely united by the chief, and the chief depends on that by the chief, and the chief depends on that union, and the strength resulting from it for its support to denote the confederacy of the States and the preservation of the Union through

Congress.

The colors of the pales are those used in the flag of the United States of America. White signifies purity and innocence; red, Kardiness and valor; and blue, the color of the chief, signifies sixtees. and valor; and blue, the color of the signifies vigilance, perseverance, and justice.—

The eye over it and the motto, Admuit coppis, 'He sanctions our endeavors,' allude to the many signal interpositions of Providence in favor of the American course. the American cause.
